Dear Bishop Ruth...

When you were ordained and consecrated the 15th bishop of our diocese, you told us that it was your deep heart's desire that we begin a new season of resurrection, hope, justice, and love in the Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina and that you would give us your best each day, walking humbly with us. You have kept your promise and thanks to your guidance, support and love, we are striving to live into your vision for us at St. Mark's, *Becoming Beloved Community for All*.

Since your last visitation, much has changed at St. Mark's. Walking with Fr. Michael the latter half of 2023, we focused our attention on being "Rooted in Abundance." In October, we held four congregational meetings using many of the observations, principles and recommendations offered by Canon Stephanie Spellers in her book titled, <u>The Church Cracked Open: Disruption, Decline</u> and New Hope for Beloved Community.

In four different sessions we discussed from *whence we've come, where we've come and where we're going*. We openly and honestly reckoned with the notion, real or perceived, that St. Mark's has a racist or elitist history. We collectively agreed that our black historic heritage and legacy, will always be an honored and cherished part of this place, yet acknowledged that we are not called to be a church primarily for blacks or whites, any more than be a church primarily for men or women, gay, straight, or transgender, those who know who they are or those who are still in the process of discerning who they are. We are called to be a church for everyone.

We also acknowledged that while St. Mark's has traditionally been a generational church, with successive generations in the same families supporting the church and continuing in its traditions, that this is no longer the case. We learned that in 2023, in the Radcliffebourgh neighborhood where we are located, there are 2751 residents, 75% of which are under the age of 30. Further, 73% of the neighborhood is white, mostly students or young professionals employed at the Medical University and 81% of Radcliffebourgh residents are undergraduate students. Only 18% of the residents are married.

As these sessions resulted in a new sense of forgiveness and mutual respect being shared among parishioners and revitalized energy, the vestry began pursuing and implementing changes to set the foundation for the hard work which need be done in 2024 to accomplish the tasks necessary for a sound future.

Cheryl Caruthers was employed as a part time Parish Administrator, to assist Fr. Michael and start the process of reorganizing office matters, at considerable cost savings to the church. New larger worship service bulletins were developed that are more inclusive, to allow visitors and parishioners alike to follow and participate in worship more easily. The office copier and computer were upgraded allowing for faster and more efficient communication. We entered into a renewed effort with our media consultant to enhance our social media outreach and established a dedicated YouTube Channel, on which to broadcast and archive our Sunday Worship services.

We assessed and upgraded our internet service, recently installing a device on the outside of the parish house providing a considerable boost in our ability to broadcast more effectively our worship service and other activities from the church. With financial assistance generously provided by you and the diocese, Bennett Preservation Engineers was engaged to undertake a structural evaluation of our buildings and their written evaluation with recommendations should be received in April 2024. The vestry and Men's Club worked together to replace the old stove with new venting in the Parish House. New efforts are underway to establish events hosted by St. Mark's quarterly, reaching out to the neighborhood and beyond in an effort to make St. Mark's more visible to the community and hopefully increase attendance and membership. Our first such effort was an Oyster Roast held on the lawn with live music on February 4, 2024, attend by approximately 150 people. We hosted this event free of charge.

In November 2023, we conducted our Annual Stewardship Campaign for 2024, under the leadership of Marj Kenney-Williams. The theme of *"Rooted in Abundance"* was embraced by everyone, with excellent results. Approximately 37 families or individuals have pledged slightly in excess of \$125,000.00 in financial support for St. Mark's in 2024. This is a significant increase in from the \$115,904.00 pledged in 2023 and astronomical increase from the \$96,920.00 pledged in 2022.

While in 2023 we focused on being "Rooted in Abundance", in 2024 we are turning our attention to "Living in Abundance." 38 of our 43 communicants in good standing have agreed to serve on some liturgical group or committee in 2024, all of which have been reconstituted. Under the leadership of Jim Hieserman, in consultation with the Reverend Dr. Jennie Olbrych, a group is working on new Mission and Vision statements. Shawan Gillians is heading a committee to revise and update the St. Mark's Constitution and Bylaws, to bring them into conformity with national church and diocesan guidelines. We've joined the Radcliffebourgh Neighborhood Association to learn of the interests of our neighbors and how we might be of assistance to them in the matters about which they are most concerned. Chris West is heading up a newly envisioned Marketing Committee, with the assistance of Walter Boags and others, who are working on new marketing opportunities, especially as it relates to promoting St. Mark's as a possible wedding venue for those seeking to be married in Charleston. While we continue to embrace our African American history, we are working to become a truly diverse and cross cultural community. And perhaps most telling, we've welcomed two new younger families into our community since September 2023, baptizing one infant on All Saint's Day, as we will be baptizing another on Easter Day 2024.

All this is being done by a group of committed Episcopalians who are looking forward, not back. Further action will be taken before the end of 2024 which hopefully will allow us to publish a parish profile early next year, with an eye on calling a new rector in 2025. We hope to work closely with you and diocesan leadership in this process, including exploring possibilities with St. Stephen's in expanding an Episcopal Campus Ministry in a shared capacity, with St. Mark's new rector perhaps working in a dual capacity.

Bishop, none of this would have happened without your encouragement, guidance and support. We know we have a lot of work to do, but we are energized and committed to do the work given us. As our bishop you have inspired and nourished us from the riches of God's grace, and as our chief pastor, you have loved us. Pray for us as we strive to become a *Beloved Community for All*, as we pray for you, that our Lord give us the strength to carry out his mission of love, justice and peace, in our church and the world.

Thank you. *We love you*.

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the Lord," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

NEW TESTAMENT READING: Hebrews 5:5-10

(Reader: A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews)

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever,

according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

Presenters: We present Eusebio "Cheo" for Confirmation. We present William Clinton to be received into this Communion. Bishop: Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil? *Candidates: I do.*

Bishop: Do you renew your commitment to Jesus Christ? *Candidates: I do, and with God's grace I will follow him as my Savior and Lord.*

After the candidates has been presented, the Bishop addresses the congregation, saying

Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support *these persons* in their life in Christ?

People: We will.

Bishop: Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant.

He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

People I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who lives and reigns now and forever. *Amen*.

The Bishop lays hands upon Cheo and says

Strengthen, O Lord, your servant Cheo with your Holy Spirit; empower him for your service; and sustain him all the days of him life. *Amen*.

The Bishop lays hands upon William and says

William, we recognize you as a member of the one holy catholic and apostolic Church, and we receive you into the fellowship of this Communion. God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, bless, preserve, and keep you. *Amen*.

The Bishop concludes with this prayer

Almighty and everlasting God, let your fatherly hand ever be over these your servants; let your Holy Spirit ever be with them; and so lead them in the knowledge and obedience of your Word, that they may serve you in this life, and dwell with you in the life to come; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, he took the cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink ye all of this; for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins. Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and, of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord; By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. *AMEN*.


And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

THE INVITATION

At St. Mark's Episcopal Church, all desiring a deepening and reaffirming relationship with Christ are invited to come forward for Holy Communion or for a blessing. This is the table not of the Church, but of Jesus Christ. It is made ready for those who love God. Come, not because the Church invites you; it is Christ who invites you to be fed and blessed here. For He knows you by name and calls you by name.

Communion will be offered in two kinds. The wine may be received by either sipping the chalice or dipping the wafer in the wine by the Eucharistic Minster. If you do not wish to receive the wine, please indicate that by crossing your arms over your chest when the chalice is presented. Communion in one kind (in bread only) is a perfectly valid way to receive the sacrament. Gluten free hosts are available upon request. For a blessing, cross your hands over your chest. If you would like to have communion brought to your seat, please let an usher know.

Welcome Bishop Ruth Loose offering to Bishop's Discretionary Fund

The Right Reverend Ruth Woodliff-Stanley was ordained 15th bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina on October 2, 2021. She is the first woman to serve in that role and the first full-time diocesan bishop of the diocese since 2012.

A native of Mississippi, the bishop earned a Bachelor of Arts in Religion and Psychology from Swarthmore College before continuing her education at Yale Divinity School and Berkeley (Master of Divinity) and Columbia University School of Social Work (Master of Science in Social Work).

She was ordained to the priesthood in the Diocese of Mississippi in June 1991. Her ministry has led her to serve as canon on the staffs of two bishops in the Episcopal Church—serving as canon to the ordinary in the Diocese of Colorado and canon for strategic change in the Dioceses of Northwestern Pennsylvania and Western New York. She has also served at a church-wide level as Interim President and Vice President of The Episcopal Church Building Fund. She has served parishes over the years as rector, priest-in-charge, and assistant rector. In addition, she has served as consultant to several dioceses, including dioceses dealing with schism or serious division, addressing needs including conflict transformation, stewardship of finances and property, and strategic planning. She has a history of activism with a focus on anti-racism work and LGBTQ advocacy.

The bishop is married to the Rev. Nathan Woodliff-Stanley and they have two adult sons, George and John.

Canon law requires every diocesan bishop to visit every congregation in his or her diocese at least once every three years. The canonical purposes of a visitation are for the bishop to examine the condition of the congregation, oversee the clergy, preach, confirm, preside at the eucharist, and examine parochial records. Each year since her election, Bishop Ruth has made an official visitation to St. Mark's Episcopal Church. As one of our diocese historic African American parishes, Bishop Ruth is committed to our wellbeing and supports efforts underway to grow our parish and strengthen its financial foundation in 2024.

It is often said that we can't get to Easter without Good Friday. My friends, there is no resurrection without the brutality of the cross.

For many of us, it is a challenge to sit in that discomfort. It is more pleasant to jump from Jesus' triumphal entry on Palm Sunday to his resurrection on Easter morning. We'd often rather avoid the challenge of Holy Week. We prefer to ignore Good Friday because it is just so hard, and it reminds us too much of the world's ugliness. It reminds us too much, perhaps, of our own role in the world's ugliness, whether intentional or by passive complicities. But that pain is a necessary part of the journey. Let's be honest: the story makes no sense when we leave out that part. More fundamentally, that week is essential to our faith.

So, I invite you now to dedicate yourself to travel the full journey of Holy Week with us at St. Mark's Episcopal Church.

From early times Christians have observed the week before Easter as a time of special devotion. From this beginning evolved the rites we observe on Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. These services provide a liturgical experience of the last days of Jesus' earthly life, as well as the time and events leading up to his resurrection.

The Book of Common Prayer provides special liturgies for each of these days. The eucharistic lectionary also provides proper readings for Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday in Holy Week. In many dioceses, the diocesan clergy will make a reaffirmation of ordination vows in the context of a eucharist during Holy Week, usually before Maundy Thursday. *The three holy days, or Triduum, of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday are at the heart of the Holy Week observance.* In many Episcopal parishes, the liturgical color for Holy Week from Palm Sunday through Maundy Thursday is red. Holy Week ends at sundown on the Saturday before Easter

Please plan to be with us on the following days, and walk with Jesus, to and through the cross, and be *resurrected*.

March 28: Maundy Thursday

6 p.m. • Maundy Thursday Liturgy

We remember the Last Supper and Jesus' final teachings to his friends. Liturgy of The Word; Washing of Feet; Holy Eucharist. The service concludes with the Stripping of the Altar. Bread and wine consecrated at the Maundy Thursday liturgy are left on the altar in the side chapel until our Good Friday service, and all are invited to spend an hour or more in prayer, inspired by Jesus' words in the Garden of Gethsemane, *"could you not stay awake with me one hour?"*

March 29: Good Friday

Noon: Stations of the Cross Liturgy

1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. • Reconciliation of a Penitent - All may, none must, some should.

Reconciliation of the Penitents is a Sacramental rite in which those who repent may confess their sins to God in the presence of a priest and receive the assurance of pardon and the grace of absolution (BCP, p. 861). It is also called penance and confession. Confessions may be heard by Fr. Michael in the Sanctuary between 1:00 and 3:00 PM. The secrecy of the confession is morally absolute for the confessor and must not be broken (BCP, p. 446).

6:00 p.m. • Good Friday Liturgy

Recalling the suffering and death of Jesus Christ, the Good Friday liturgy is out-of-joint. The Passion Gospel; Solemn Collects; Contemplation of the Cross, with communion distributed.

March 30: Holy Saturday

12 p.m. • Holy Saturday Liturgy

A very short service, lasting only 15 minutes, listening to and contemplating a homily some scholars believe was composed by Melito, bishop of Sardis, who died circa 180.

March 31: Easter Sunday

10:00 a.m. - The Feast of the Resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ with Baptism.

Altar Flower Donations – Altar Flowers may be donated by signing up for any given Sunday in the Altar Flower Notebook in the church Narthex. Suggested donation is a minimum of \$40.00.

A Lenten Prayer by Henri Nouwen

The Lenten season begins. It is a time to be with you, Lord, in a special way, a time to pray, to fast, and thus to follow you on your way to Jerusalem, to Golgotha, and to the final victory over death.

I am still so divided. I truly want to follow you, but I also want to follow my own desires and lend an ear to the voices that speak about prestige, success, pleasure, power, and influence. Help me to become deaf to these voices and more attentive to your voice, which calls me to choose the narrow road to life.

I know that Lent is going to be a very hard time for me. The choice for your way has to be made every moment of my life. I have to choose thoughts that are your thoughts, words that are your words, and actions that are your actions. There are not times or places without choices. And I know how deeply I resist choosing you.

Please, Lord, be with me at every moment and in every place. Give me the strength and the courage to live this season faithfully, so that, when Easter comes, I will be able to taste with joy the new life that you have prepared for me. Amen.

The Rites of Confirmation and Reception

Confirmation and Reception, sacramental rites marked by a public affirmation of faith, will be conferred by our bishop during her visitation today.

Confirmation has a complicated history. In the early Church, adults converting to Christianity were baptized by a bishop. Baptism was characterized by immersion in water, anointing with oil, and the laying on of hands. Over time, as more children were born to Christian parents, infant baptism became the norm. Since the local bishop was unable to be present as often as needed, baptism was delegated to parish priests. However, the laying on of hands remained a ritual action reserved to bishops alone, so those baptized by a priest had to present themselves to a bishop at a later time. The sacramental rite of Confirmation emerged out of this development. In the 1979 Prayer Book, we find this introduction to the rite: "...*Those baptized at an early age are expected, when they are ready and have been duly prepared, to make a mature public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their Baptism and to receive the laying on of hands by the bishop.*" (p. 412) Those baptized as children are usually confirmed during adolescence to publicly affirm for themselves the baptismal vows made for them by parents and godparents, however confirmation can take place anytime in a baptized person's life.

Reception refers to the rite by which a baptized Christian, confirmed by a bishop, is welcomed into the fellowship of the Episcopal Church. It too, is a public affirmation; like those being confirmed, candidates for reception also make a profession of faith and renew the Baptismal Covenant. Since they are already confirmed, the bishop does not lay hands on them. Candidates who have previously been confirmed, but not by a bishop, receive the laying on of hands along with others being confirmed.

Please join in congratulating Cheo and William for stepping up and out by choosing to affirm their faith and discipleship in our community today, each acknowledging that they are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. *AMEN*!
