Welcome to Eastertide

Easter Sunday is only a beginning!

The Great Fifty Days of Easter, also referred to as the season of Eastertide, is a time when we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ and all that means for us, leading to the launching of the Christian Church and its mission on Pentecost.

Although many people are familiar with Easter Day when the Church celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, you may not know that it always falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after March 21. This was determined in 325CE at the Council of Nicaea in attempt to have all Christians celebrate on the same day with limited success, since Orthodox Christians use a different calendar. Eastertide is a season that actually lasts 50 days.

Why 50 days? It's actually quite simple. After the resurrection, Jesus spent forty days on earth before he ascended, which is commemorated on Ascension Day, May 9 this year. Then there were ten more days after that before the Day of Pentecost, or *Whitsunday*, which is celebrated on May 19 this year.

Luke writes in the first chapter of the Book of Acts that Jesus "presented himself alive to them after his suffering by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God." In chapter two, we hear the followers of Jesus gathered for the Day of Pentecost, which actually means "fifty." It happened during the Hebrew feast of *Shavuot*, which is why the followers of Jesus were gathering. The Hebrew festival was originally a harvest first fruits celebration and later it evolved into a commemoration of the giving of the Law to Moses on Mt. Sinai.

These Great Fifty Days are a celebration of the Resurrection of Christ and all that means for us, leading to the launching of the Christian Church and its mission on Pentecost. During this time, Episcopalians once again use the word *alleluia*, which they refrain from using during the penitential season of Lent and the confession is omitted from the liturgy. So, for the next few weeks, the priest will still exclaim "Alleluia. Christ is Risen" on Sunday mornings, to which the people will reply, "The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia." The Paschal Candle is lit on Easter and on Sundays during Eastertide which symbolizes the risen Christ. Paschal means "related to Easter or Passover," which is why Eastertide is sometimes called Paschaltide and Jesus is sometimes called the "Paschal Lamb." The church also uses white (and sometimes gold) vestments, which is the color designated for feasts and festivals. Eastertide ends on the Day of Pentecost, which commemorates the Holy Spirit descending on the disciples in the form of tongues of fire. Interestingly, word Pentecost means "fiftieth day" in Greek.

Easter and Eastertide are the high point of our Church year, so it makes sense we should celebrate for a prolonged period of time. After all, the main point of the whole gospel is to prepare us for an eternal feast!

THE LESSONS

FIRST READING: Acts 1:15-17, 21-26

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the crowd numbered about one hundred twenty persons) and said, "Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus-- for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry. So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us-one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection." So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, "Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles.

THE NICENE CREED



If you would like to have communion brought to your seat, please let an usher know.





Make a Special Offering of Financial Support this month!

Earlier this year the Vestry authorized spending an additional \$200 a month, for five months, to "boost" our outreach and St. Mark's exposure on Social Media Platforms, which has evidenced amazing results. 

A Mother's Day Message from Fr. Michael

Many of you know that I always refer to the Holy Spirit as "she". Although I suspect some theologians or perhaps even clergy colleagues might object, on this Mother's Day let me share with you my thoughts about our Mothering God.

I believe that Scripture informs us that Yahweh, the God of Israel, is a gender-neutral term. The personal name of God, Yahweh, which is revealed to Moses in Exodus 3, is a remarkable combination of both female and male grammatical endings. The first part of God's name in Hebrew, "Yah," is feminine, and the last part, "weh," is masculine.

The Greek word for spirit, *paraclete*, is also gender neutral. Yet, in the Aramaic, the language Jesus spoke, the Spirit of Yahweh was referred to in the feminine, *rucha*, *or ruach*. Markios, an Egyptian monk who lived in c300-390, one of the most authoritative Desert Fathers of Egypt, picks up on this and repeatedly stressed that just as there is no human birth without a mother, there is also no spiritual birth without the Holy Spirit. When humanity is born anew in the Spirit, they become children of the Spirit, who is their mother.

Did you know that *Sophia* is the Greek word for *Wisdom*? She appears in the Old and New Testaments as a mother, a bride, and a child. She is present at creation. Scripture calls her divine, eternal, and all-powerful. She is ever present and knows all things. She is available to all, and She will blow into the hearts of anyone who listens to Her voice. In fact, the Church canonized the Book of Wisdom about Her in the Old Testament. The Orthodox liturgy calls upon Her before each gospel is read aloud, "Sofia!"

Just take a moment today and reflect quietly on words from the Wisdom of Solomon 7:24-28.

For Wisdom is more mobile than any motion; because of Her pureness, she pervades and penetrates all things. For she is a breath of the power of God, and a pure emanation of the glory of the Almighty; therefore nothing defiled gains entrance into Her. For she is a reflection of eternal light, a spotless mirror of the working of God, and an image of his goodness. Although she is but one, she can do all things, and while remaining in Herself, she renews all things; in every generation, she passes into holy souls and makes them friends of God, and prophets; for God loves nothing so much as the person who lives with Wisdom.

So, on this Mother's Day, let us be mindful that our Mothering God is the power of Yahweh and a reflection of eternal light. She teaches justice and courage. Yahweh loves nothing so much as the person who lives with Her. Look for Her and you will find her. She will dwells within each of us richly and guides us home. *Thanks be to God!*
